


NEWS FROM THE PARISH: FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS IN SEDGFORD

The Parish Council have invited a representative of the Borough Council to come to the open part of the next Parish Meeting on the 15th June at 6.30pm to discuss the Boroughs plans to develop two sites in the Village. The Borough Council has drawn up plans to develop the land above Mill View in front of the Hastoe development and a strip of land at the end of Jarvie Close backing onto the Old Mill and Fields End. They propose 9 units on the piece above Mill View and 4 on the end of the grass backing onto the Mill. The Parish Council invites residents to come along to the meeting and listen to what is proposed and share their views with the Borough Council. The clerk does have a set of plans that can be viewed at his house on request at a mutually convenient time. A set will go on display on the new notice board on the Heacham Road when it goes up in the next couple of weeks. Do come along and share your views with the Borough and the Parish.

WOMEN'S FRIENDSHIP GROUP



We had a very good attendance at our May meeting for a most informative and interesting talk by DS Colin Cummings from the East Midlands Specialist Operations Unit dealing with Homicide. Colin has been a policeman for 27 years and spent 14 years in crime detection. There were 574 murders in the UK in 2014. The homicide rates in Boston, Lincolnshire are now as high as those in parts of Brazil. When investigating a crime the crime investigating team work to a manual and go through procedures thoroughly and with great precision calling in many other experts along the way together with help from CCTV cameras, DNA, fingerprints etc. When harvesting evidence, often looking at the 'Lifestyle' of the victim helps to find how the person died. Did you know

that the first fingerprints were used for crime investigation in 1800 in India?

THE NEWSLETTER ARCHIVE.

I have begun the mountainous task of scanning every existing Newsletter that has been printed since the first issue for July 1970, into a digital pdf format for posterity. There is, however, an almost 4 year gap in the archive from August 1974 to April 1978; most of this can be put down to the fact that the SVN wasn't actually printed under that title though alternative publications were printed by Canon TL Livermore and then by the Rev. George Shelley during this period in the form of the Sedgeford Parish Newsletter and Church Newsletters - not all of these are extant. Prior to the Sedgeford Village News there had been regular half page church bulletins dropped through our letter boxes and regular entries in the Heacham Rural Deanery Magazine - these too are an endangered species!



With the advent of digital and computer technology one would think such things would be 'safe' but even modern technology can hiccup with files lost through irretrievable hard drive failures. Fortunately every Newsletter issue since its relaunch in May 1978 is accounted for if not in digital, then in a 'hard copy' printed form.

Walter Edgar Gooderham:



Private 25459, 2nd Battalion, Grenadier Guards. Killed in action in France & Flanders on Tuesday 9 October 1917. Age 27. Born Gathorpe, Norfolk. Enlisted King's Lynn. Son of Alfred Gooderham, of Knettishall, Diss; husband of Ethel H. Gooderham, of Church Farm, Theltenham, Diss, Norfolk. No known grave. Commemorated on Tyne Cot Memorial, Zonnebeke, West-Vlaanderen, Belgium. (Panel 9).

WWI Roll of Honour:

Frederick Arthur Marshall:



Private 28395, 9th Battalion, The Loyal North Lancashire Regiment. Formerly 8943 The Royal West Surrey Regiment. Killed in action in France & Flanders on Friday 22 March 1918. Age 36. Born and resident Sedgeford. Son of John and Harriet (nee Sandford) Marshall. Enlisted Norwich. Formerly 8943, Royal West Surrey Regiment. Buried in Beaumetz-Les-Cambrai Military Cemetery No. 1, Pas de Calais, France. (Plot/Row/Section I. Grave A).
